BLACK HISTORY MONTH

In the United States, Black History Month is commemorated during the month of February. It began as a way of remembering important people and events in the history of the African diaspora, initially lasting a week before becoming a month-long observation in 1970. Since its inception, the Black community met the creation of Black History Month with an enthusiastic response; it prompted the creation of Black history clubs, an increase in interest among teachers, and progressive whites. Black History Month has also expanded beyond its initial acceptance in educational establishments. The Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH), designates a theme each year. The 2025 Black History Month theme, "African Americans and Labor," highlights and celebrates the significant contributions of African Americans in all occupations and public service while acknowledging their past labor struggles.




INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE HIGHLIGHT OF THE MONTH

Black and African American are not always interchangeable. Some individuals prefer the term Black because they do not identify as African and/or American. Some individuals may identify as African, Afro-Caribbean or Afro-Latino. Be specific when referencing a group; Black clients, Black students, Black faculty members, etc., not Blacks. Be mindful and really consider the necessity of using race as an identifier within your communications.

SUSAN B. ANTHONY DAY

Susan B. Anthony (born Susan Anthony; February 15, 1820 – March 13, 1906) was an American social reformer and women's rights activist who played a pivotal role in the women's suffrage movement. Born into a Quaker family committed to social equality, she collected anti-slavery petitions at the age of 17. In 1856, she became the New York state agent for the American Anti-Slavery Society.

In 1851, she met Elizabeth Cady Stanton, who became her lifelong friend and co-worker in social reform activities, primarily in the field of women's rights. They initiated the American Equal Rights Association, which campaigned for equal rights for both women and African Americans.
